# Pet Rules for Park Visitors

### Be a good pet Neighbor

- Pets must be kept on a leash no longer than 8 feet and be under physical control at all times. Do not tie your pet to a tree or shrub.
- No person shall allow his or her pet or other domestic animals to bite, molest, or annoy other park visitors. These animals shall not disturb the peace of the park.
- Keep your dog from wandering to another site or digging holes.

For the safety of your pet and others, please read the following information to make your visit a safe and fun time for everyone.

### Keep your pet out of Park buildings

- With the exception of canine companion dogs for persons with disabilities, pets are not permitted on any of the designated swimming beach or in any public building unless so posted.

### Dispose of your pet's waste

- You must pick up after your pet by placing any feces from your pet in a plastic or paper sack and deposit the sack into a garbage can.

*Fort Flagler State Park has provided "Doggy Bags" for your convenience. You will find the dispensers throughout the park at major locations. They are also provided at Mystery Bay and Anderson Lake parks.*

### Take care of Your pet

- Be extra careful about leashing your animal to avoid injury to your pet. Automobiles and bikes travel throughout the park, and accidents occur when an animal is not controlled.
- Be careful about leaving your pet in your car on a hot summer day. The inside of a car heats very quickly. For example, on an 85 degree day, the temperature inside your car with the windows slightly opened will reach 102 degrees in 10 minutes, and 120 degrees in 30 minutes. A dog's normal body temperature is 101.5 to 102.2 degrees, and a dog can withstand a body temperature of 107-108 degrees only a short time before suffering irreparable brain damage or even death.
- If your pet is overcome by heat exhaustion, you can give immediate first aid by immersing the animal in cool water until the body temperature is lowered.
