As you may know the Radio Officer is a very important position in the Club. The Radio Officer is more than just the manager of the Clubs' repeaters. He is the registered agent for the club with the State of Washington, the registered holder of the K7LED Club Callsign, and is responsible as Trustee of all the Mike and Key equipment. It is my intention to enlist the aid of the Technical Committee to help with the management of the Clubs' repeaters.

In the last year we have had some growing pains in getting a new Motorola two-meter repeater operational at the East Tiger Mountain site. A lot of work has been done by Paul and the technical committee to try to get the system operational from this site.

I wish to thank George Bisso, W7GLB, for his assistance in working with Paul and the Technical Committee in this effort. In the meantime George had volunteered to put together a repeater based upon some GE equipment that he had. This is the equipment that is currently in operation from a Cougar Mountain site that is maintained by George. We are indebted to George for providing this site for us to use while we work out the problems at Tiger Mountain.

It is my intent, along with the Technical Committee, to continue to work the problems at the East Tiger Mountain site. A Motorola repeater was purchased last year with the sole purpose that this system be installed on Tiger Mountain as the primary repeater system. [Continued on Page 5]

I have been informed by Mike, K7OV, that the Motorola repeater and six-cavity duplexer, is currently at the Cougar Mountain site managed by George, W7GLB. After I was appointed as the Radio Officer, Mike had suggested to George that this equipment be made available to me. However, George had indicated to Mike that he would not do that until he had a chance to talk with our Board.

I have contacted George in an attempt to gain access to that equipment so that we can continue with our troubleshooting and testing on Tiger Mountain. As of this date, George has not allowed access to this equipment. It appears that there are some open issues that need to be resolved regarding the providing of the GE repeater and other work that George has done for the club.

I have contacted George and asked to meet with him so that the issues can be resolved. At first George was reluctant to meet with me. The situation is further exacerbated by the late onset of his personal, health-related issues. George has asked, through Mike (K7OV), that neither I nor members of the Board contact him during this time of his illness. We all, of course, wish George a speedy and full recovery from his illness. According to Mike, George will get back to me and the Board when his health improves.

In regard to some statements made by Mike Eakins, K7OV, I wish to make it perfectly clear to all the Club members, that I have never misrepresented the Club, nor have there been any misguiding or untrue statements made, or implied, to George, as Radio Officer or as a member of the Board. I also know of no one on the Board, during my short tenure, that has done so. In fact, during my short term as Chairman of the Board, the Board provided George and others involved in the work with the repeater system, Certificates of Appreciation and thankful expression of the work that has been done.

I first became aware of some of the related issues while Chairman of the Board. However, not all of them had been disclosed to me until I became Radio Officer. I wish to thank Mike for his input in making me aware of some of the issues. That having been said, all I have to work with is third-hand information. Until George is able to discuss these with me directly, some of these will likely remain unresolved. It is important to note, that all bills that have been presented to the Radio Officer and to the Club by George have been promptly paid.

Currently, the GE repeater system is in operation and perfoming very well from George's Cougar Mountain location. The 224.12 repeater is in operation from the East Tiger Mountain site and is performing very well. George did perform some maintenance on the 220 system and installed a PL decoder set to 103.5hz. So if you havn't been able to access the 224.12 repeater lately, try setting your PL to 103.5.

Some of the tasks that need to be accomplished before seasonal inclement weather presents further obstacles on Tiger are: (1) Installation of tip supports on the 224.12 and 146.82 repeater antennas, and (2) further testing and installation of the Motorola System on Tiger. I will keep the membership apprised of the progress and the need for help as the occasions

My thanks for your patience and all those who have taken time to read and absorb some of the tough issues presented here. I wish to engage in, and maintain a candid dialogue with accurate disclosure of events which involve the Club's repeater equipment, its related operational context, and I look forward with enthusiasm to your continued support as I serve the Club as your new Radio Officer.

# Welcome to the New Batch of Hams

Over the last weekend of August a dozen students gathered at the Red Cross Chapter in Seattle for a Technician class amateur radio training course, which was co-sponsored by Mike and Key and the Seattle Red Cross.

Taught by two club members, Mike Eakins K7OV and Tim Kane K7ANE, the class covered all of Element 2, in preparation for the Technician class exam, which was held on Sunday afternoon. Another M&K member, Steven Kangas W9SK, assisted in the testing portion as the third volunteer examiner.

The students also received generous support from several amateur radio manufacturers, retailers, and organizations, which provided amateur radio charts and maps, catalogs, and brochures. These groups included Icom, Yaesu, Alinco, Kenwood, DX Engineering, MFJ, AES, Universal Radio, ARRL and Mike & Key ARC.

The trainees did very well on the test, with nearly half the class, five students, scoring 100 percent. Most others missed only one to three questions, so scored over 90 percent.

Four of the students came from our cosponsoring organization, the Seattle Red Cross, one staff employee, and three members of their First Aid Support Team (FAST). Another four were active in various community emergency preparedness groups, such as CERT and SNAP.

One class member was an experienced boater, who wanted to add SSB ham band HF to his marine communications options. Another was a lapsed ham, who wanted to get back into the hobby.

### ==> GOVERNOR'S \$250,000 GRANT TO AMATEUR RADIO GOES ONLINE AS OREGON HAMS INSTALL NEW WINLINK SYSTEM

This month, Oregon ARES members will complete the state-wide installation of Winlink <a href="http://www.winlink.org/">http://www.winlink.org/">http://www.winlink.org/</a>, thanks to a \$250,000 grant from Governor Ted Kulongoski. In 2007, the governor was impressed by the hams' ability to handle emergency communications when severe winter storms wreaked havoc on Oregon's North Coast and flooded the City of Vernonia, knocking out 911 services. Internet and phone service for an extended period of time <a href="http://www.arrl.org/news/stories/2007/12/05/100/">http://www.arrl.org/news/stories/2007/12/05/100/>. The Oregon Office of Emergency Management said that during the storms, the radio operators were "tireless in their efforts to keep the systems connected." When even state police had difficulty reaching some of their own troops, ham radio worked, setting up networks so emergency officials could communicate and relaying lists of supplies needed in stricken areas.

"I'm going to tell you who the heroes were from the very beginning of this...the ham radio operators," the governor said at the time. "These people just came in and actually provided a tremendous communication link to us." Because of the service rendered by Amateur Radio operators in providing communications support, the governor allocated funds for the installation of a Winlink system to integrate Amateur Radio with the Internet.

The equipment will be installed in the Emergency Operating Center in each of Oregon's 36 counties. Once the monies were distributed, ARES members researched and purchased the equipment that would be needed, formalized and signed contracts between the state, counties and ARES, and allocated space to install the antennas and equipment within each EOC. The project is scheduled to be completed in time for the 2009 ARRL Simulated Emergency Test (SET) scheduled for October 3-4

"Using Winlink equipment and other amateur equipment already in place at the EOCs, ARES teams will have to quickly create a communications network, in some instances without depending on other infrastructure such as telephones or Internet," said ARRL Oregon Section Public Information Coordinator Steve Sanders, KE7JSS. "Many will not use

commercial electric power. Despite these limitations, the ARES teams should not only be able to quickly pass local messages, but also communicate with other regions of the country. The ability to pass information in and out of disaster areas is crucial to the effectiveness of emergency responders."

When Oregon's State Office of Emergency
Management was activated on December 3, 2007

hams over the course of the next four days used
Winlink to pass message traffic. "The Winlink system
performed perfectly, and the ARES team at the OEM

Center," said Marion County ARES Emergency
Coordinator Dean Davis, N7XG. "The only mode of
communications for several Oregon counties for the
first two days of the storm was the Winlink system."

### ==>SOLAR UPDATE

Tad "Who loves to peer up at the morning Sun" Cook, K7RA, this week reports: No new sunspot activity this week, and no emerging sunspots are visible on the far side of the Sun. Sunspot region 1025 (or 11025) that appeared over August 31 and September 1 faded more than a week ago, and the area in which it appeared has just rotated over the Sun's western limb. Sunspot numbers for September 3-9 were 0, 0, 0, 0, 0, 0, and 0 with a mean of 0. The 10.7 cm flux was 68.6, 68.4, 68.5, 69.2, 68.8, 68.9 and 69.2 with a mean of 68.8. The estimated planetary A indices were 4, 5, 2, 3, 3, 2 and 1 with a mean of 2.9. The estimated midlatitude A indices were 4, 4, 2, 2, 3, 2 and 3 with a mean of 2.9.

The average daily solar flux for this week was up slightly, just 0.7 points, to 68.8. Geomagnetic A indices were quieter, with last week's average daily planetary and mid-latitude A index at 5.7 and 4.1 respectively, while both numbers dropped to 2.9 for this week. The planetary A index is projected to be 5 for today through September 14, then 8 for September 15-18. Solar flux is expected to be 69 for today and tomorrow, then 68 for September 13-19. Geophysical Institute Prague predicts quiet conditions for September 11-12, quiet to unsettled on September 13, 15 and 17 and unsettled on September 14 and 16.
