So, what does all that above mean? The date, time, and call should be obvious. Those are the "targets" for our imaginary December list. Each time you contact that station, you earn the indicated points. If you worked ZL50VK once on SSB, once on CW, and once on RTTY; you would have earned 75 points. What if you work NI6IW on 20 and 40 Meters? Because it's the same mode, then there are no additional points. The Multiplier can be earned only once (for the whole year). So if you work NI6IW and WD6RAT, you can only count the CA multiplier once. The VE8SUN station is worth 2 multipliers! One for Canada and one for the Northern Territories (NT). If there is any question about the individual operation, you can go to http://www.arrl.org/special_events/search and search on Jan 1-31 2011 or on the station call sign.

Jim N7MU has said he'll be coming up with a spreadsheet to support this test. I'll try to see if it can be available by the next Club meeting. If you need to review the published rules for this Club contest, they are in the October Relay at:

WANDERING - DXCC QRP

A number of years ago, I was sitting in my ham shack sorting some QSL cards - and, of course, my radio was tuned to 20M. All of a sudden, an extremely loud Italian station popped up, calling CQ in some EU contest or other.

I started to reach for the power switch on my Amplifier (1500W), and then thought, "Why do I want to work another Italian station?" And then a thought came to me, and I reached for my Kenwood TS-940S and turned the power control all the way down to the stop. With that done, I called and worked that Italian station, and went on to work another 8 or 9 other EU stations. My thought, "Boy, is this great or what?" Later, my curiosity got the best of me, and a quick check told me the output power was just 4W. "Holy mackerel, that's the power level of the night light in our bathroom." Wow, what a trip for me - I had shifted gears from 1,500 Watts to 4 Watts - a 99.7% power reduction!

It's my guess that most if not all QRP activity takes place on CW. As I recall I only worked or heard just one other fellow operating QRP Phone. Of interest, the ARRL QRP Award pictures a fellow with key in hand - no mike is sight. I suspect there are very few hams who have achieved DXCC on QRP phone.

There were several amusing and interesting events during my QRP travels. Among them:

- 1- When I had worked 99 countries, I realized I not worked a single U.S. station. It seemed like a super idea for this to be Country #100. So, tuning around, I heard an east coast station calling CQ. After the usual exchange, I said, "Thanks for being my 100th country." His response was a confused, stuttering, "What do you mean?" I understood his query immediately as I doubt anyone has said, "Thank you" to any U.S. station contact we have ever used for DXCC credit we just pick up any U.S. card from our QSL collections.
- **2-** As evidence of the power of QRP, I had my beam headed north one day when I heard a weak DX station which ultimately turned into a new DX station for me. I could hear the operator was a YL, but I had a very tough time getting her call. After a number of "Again, again" calls, I finely got her call it was a DXpedition in the PACIFIC. I had my beam off the target by 45°. Wow, 45° off and 4-W ... who would imagine a QSO was possible.
- **3-** My best DX was with a station in Kerguelen Island in the Indian Ocean which is just about on the other side of the world and earned a *1000-Mile-Per-Watt* certificate 1566 miles per watt.

My QSO routine was simple, I just made contact with no mention of "QRP", and only after I received my signal report did I mention running 4W.

It's surprising how a single moment led to my pursuit of DX with just 4W and ending up with 135 QRP countries.

At 4 months she rolled off the couch then got up and started running and she has been on the go ever since. At 1 year old she was found on the roof top of the neighbor's house.

She went to many different schools in the Spokane area graduating from Freeman High School. There she took wood shop where she found that she had a real gift for working with her hands. She started doing her bead work by buying a book and she taught herself which started many great years of bead work.

Tressie went to Spokane Community College graduating in 1979 with a degree in drafting. She worked at Boeing for a short time. She went on a church mission to Snowflake, AZ, in the Four Corners area.

Tressie and I were married on April 6, 1991 in Puyallup and were sent to Hawaii for our honeymoon by our boss and his wife. They had us go back there for our 5-year Anniversary.

When I received my Ham Call, Tressie would always want me to pass on messages to fellow Hams that she knew. I would not always pass it on as she had stated and finally decided to get herself a Call.

After she passed the test a fellow Ham ask if she wanted to call me by radio with the news. She said no since she did not have her Call. The friend said that she could using *third-party traffic*.

Boy was she mad at me for not telling her about it before then. In the first week of her getting her Call, she had made over 200 contacts on 2-meters. Her Call Sign was *KC7BAL*, or as she would say, *BE A LADY*.

We became life members of the Radio club of Tacoma. She helped at WW2END and other special events. About 15 years ago we joined the Mike & Key Club where she again made many good friends. She always looked forward to the Flea Market and Field Day.

Tressie was one who made friends vary easily. She never asked anyone for more than she was willing to give back to the friendship. Quite often she would go out of her way to help others, expected nothing in return.

Tressie was quite the lady I will miss her and will never forget how much she helped me make it through my life.

I would like to challenge each one of you to look at the relationships you have, and whether you are the friend you need to be. Tressie was and still is. She will survive in the hearts and memories of those people she met, befriended and just allowed to get to know her. I hope each of you will not forget to thank your friends and to become a true friend like Tressie has become to many of you.

M&K Year-End Door Prize Showdown

Finally - the big year-end door prize drawing we've been waiting for! A year's worth of door prize tickets (2,338) will be shuffled and shuffled again just waiting to be selected as one of the four lucky tickets.

The rules for this drawing are slightly different than our regular monthly drawings.

- First, you do not have to be present to win. Don't worry, we'll track you down if you're a winner.
- Second, all contestants are eligible to win only one prize regardless of how often we draw one of their tickets. There will be four different winners, one for each of the four prizes.
- And third, the prizes are identified as 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th. But they may not be awarded in that order.

So here's how this will work. A winner who is present can choose from the remaining unclaimed prizes regardless of the prize's designation – 1st, 2nd, etc. On the other hand, a winner who is not present will be awarded the next available prize in order. Yes, it's a little confusing, but winners who are present can choose from the available remaining prizes rather than being assigned one. I'll go over this explanation again just before the actual drawing.

So do your homework and come prepared to choose when we draw your ticket. Good luck to all of you. Here are the prizes.

Pearl Harbor Attack first reported by Alaska short wave radio operator

Though the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Hawaii killed more than 2,400 people, sank the USS Arizona and marked the U.S. entry into World War II, history has all but forgotten Alaskan Augie Hiebert's unique role in the events of Dec. 7, 1941.

Hiebert's daughter Robin A. Chlupach of Willow preserved the story in her 1992 book "Airwaves over Alaska: Story of Pioneer Broadcaster Augie Hiebert." And the story is also part of the U.S. Senate Congressional record from June 26, 2003, when Hiebert's actions were commended by the U.S. Senate.

He came to Alaska in 1939 and was operating a radio station in Fairbanks for Capt. Lathrop when he heard the first report on the raid on Pearl Harbor.

"He was operating his own short-wave radio when he heard the news," his daughter said. "That's what he did every morning — he got up every morning and got on his shortwave radio."

He called the top military commander in Fairbanks and reported the radio transmission he'd heard, she said. His report was the first word military leaders in Alaska had of the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Hiebert was a pioneer in radio and television broadcasting in Alaska. He also helped to establish Alaska's first satellite station activated in 1970.

He died at the age of 90 on Sept. 13, 2007.
