

Harold Reed, K7JGM By Jim Monson, K7JGM

Callsign history can be fun. I was originally licensed KD7HLJ in 1999 and in 2013 I decided to get a vanity callsign. Anything ending with JGM would have been fine business and all prefixes except K7 were taken so I became K7JGM.

I did a Google search for K7JGM and found it belonged to a Harold (Hal) Reed. He was into RTTY and the Indy 500. Here is a link RTTY image that is associated with him: indy500.pix - RTTY

Open the link with Notepad, it's pretty cool! A few weeks ago I was playing with WSPR, Weak Signal Propagation Report Network, and I received the following email from Bob Satterley, K7POF:

"Jim: Thanks for the report on WSPR. Here is a picture of a QSL Card that I received Years ago. At that time I was W6BTV. My late wife and I visited Hal one time when we were in the NW." 73 Bob K7POF/W6BTV




I was very surprised by Bob's email... small world surprised. Hal's QSL card is a very "Vintage", quasi "Art Deco" style card so it appealed to me immediately. As a tribute to Hal Reed, K7JGM and because I like the card design, I have decided to re do my QSL card:



Mine is still in the works. It does not have the "vintage charm" of Hal's card but it is getting there.

Vintage N7WA

Jim's article prompted me to drag out some history of my callsign ... well almost. When I got N7WA, it was a first time issue when the first vanity gate opened up in 1996. So, I'm an original (in a variety of ways). However, Danny K7SS, who collects vintage cards ran across the following a few years ago and sent a scan of it to me, W7WA, and K7WA.



It's pretty hard to make out, but the call owner was a Walter Oberst in Spokane and he was confirming a QSO with 7RY on May 13th 1927. He was running 45 watts and was a proud member of the ARRL as well as an Official Relay Station. He even listed some of his best DX (9DSW, probably in the mid-west)

Call sign prefixes went into effect in 1928. US possessions and territories would get K and the continental Hams would get W. So, most likely, Walter became W7WA sometime in 1928.

Training Daniel Stevens KL7WM

All the 36 students in the September Technician class passed and two also pass the General test. That brings the total new hams to 203 this year. With those who passed several test at one session, we have 175 New Technicians, 75 Generals and 22 Extras.

There is a Technician class on November 12th and 19th, 2016 in Ballard and another Technician class on December 3rd and 10th, 2106 in Issaquah.

The Extra training slides have been updated to refelct the new questions, but still need illustrations added to the 140 new questions. An Extra class may be scheduled after the first of the year.

Maria Somma, AB1FM, Chief of ARRLVEC, said that the ham growth is ahead of last year by 6% in the first 4 months. We should see 32,000 new amateurs in 2016.

Three Book Reviews Michael, N7WA

I don't usually read too many books related to Ham Radio in any given time frame but this summer has seen me go through three. In order...

Contact Sport by Jim George N3BB

This book is about the World Radio Team Championships (WRTC) held in 2014 in Massachusetts. Jim was not a participant but he was a volunteer driver which enabled him to observe several team/sites and get a first-hand look at the behind-the-scenes workings of the WRTC. I have a deep interest in the WRTC (the concept was born in Seattle in 1990) due to being a contesters. These are my peers. I enjoyed the book but it's not an exciting nor fast paced story. (After all, it's about a Ham Radio contest.) It was interesting to read about the issues going on in the background with logistics (like getting lost) and equipment. I probably had higher expectations as a contester but the book has generally received good reviews. I'm not sure a non-Ham would get too much out it. (three and a half stars out five.) Lots of B/W photos. I would have given this up to the Club Library but I purchased it as a Kindle edition. Maybe it could go on the future purchase list for the Club Library.

200 Meters and Down by Clinton DeSoto

After my trip to the Spark Museum in Bellingham, I was looking for more information on the early days of Ham Radio. We didn't have this book in the Club Library but Toku got one in soon after I had inquired (I was going to buy my own).

This book deals with the history of Ham Radio from the 1900's to the mid-1930's (when it was published). Be forewarned, the style of writing is from that era and I found it was something I had to get used too. It's also written more as a historic treatise than a more informal style and there is a fair amount of repetition. That said, if you want a detailed description of

what Ham Radio was like in the early years and how the ARRL got its start, it's a worthwhile read. Just don't expect to be too entertained... this is a teaching book. (three stars out of five)

A Year of DX by Bob Locher W9KNI

Old timers will recognize Bob as the author of *The Complete DX'er*, a must-read for any new DX'er. (I read it decades ago.) This book, published in 2010 describes Bob's entry into a year-long competition... the CQ DX Marathon. The goal of this competition is to work the most number of unique DX entities between January 1 and December 31 (UTC). It's a world-wide competition.

Bob now lives in southern Oregon so his issues with propagation match my own. The book is divided into 12 monthly chapters as well as chapters on general topics of interest to DX'ers. The book can be repetitious and, as an old-timer, much of the information is not new to me. Still Bob is a good story teller. I won this (signed) book at the DX Convention so I'll donate it to the Club Library. It won't cost you anything to give it a read. (three and a half stars out of five)

Come one, come all.

Salmon Run 2016 - N7WA/M

The preparation for this Salmon Run started right after I got home from the 7QP in May. The first thing I did was ask Scott AG7T, the owner of the KX3/KXPA100 I had borrowed, if he was willing to sell. I got a solid no. Then, I had to decide between a KX2 (which had just been announced) and my own KX3. I was still in the throes of making that decision, on the verge of going to SEAPAC to look at one, when a KX3 came up on Eham that was too good a deal to pass up. Alas, the KXPA100 also offered was already sold but I was half way to my goal. I played with the KX3 QRP style until August when I couldn't wait any longer and finally ordered one from Elecraft. (Since then, used ones have popped up all over... sigh!)

Those who read my 7QP article will remember the heat issue I had, so I built a cooling fan for the KXPA100 using two 12V muffins fans I could drive at 6V or 12V (low and high speed). They are very quiet on low speed and sit right on the amp's cooling fins. I also decided it was time get a separate (sealed) battery and a device to charge it. Finally, the KXPA100 really likes 13.8 volts or higher so I got a boost regulator. I'm really glad I have the Access cab for the Tacoma - I need all that room behind the seats. Completing the setup was a spare bug-catcher antenna to complement my Hi-Q. With two antennas, I figured I would be switching back and forth between 40M and 20M.

Last year, I went solo but Jim, K7ND volunteered to drive again this year. Jim doesn't want to operate and just enjoys the trip. My plan was to activate all 20 counties in eastern Washington. Usually, we have to skip one but I have finally figured out a route that makes it possible. It does involve some backtracking and skipping most of Spokane and Whitman but those are well populated counties anyway. My main concern was propagation - would it be a bust this year?

This test starts at 9AM. We left Kent at 6AM on a wet morning; stopping at Cle Elum for breakfast. We would start just short of the county line at Blewitt pass to activate Kittitas. It didn't start well. After 20 minutes, there were only 6 Q's in the log when we started through Chelan county. Getting out of the hills, things slowly

improved. Still, signals were weak and when a couple Europeans checked in. It was tough in the noisy environment of Wenatchee. As we crossed into Douglas, we had another 20Q's in the log and things continued to improve. Maybe this wouldn't be so bad after all. The trip across Douglas is about an hour but once you are up on the plateau it's a quiet drive. The long stretch allowed me to put in another 40+ Q's but we were now entering Grant County which is problematic on the route I had chosen.

We were going up Banks Lake towards the Grand Coulee dam. This puts us right along the Coulee walls that line the road. My rate dropped to nearly zero until we reached Electric City and boom..., I was talking to people again. We stopped at the Safeway for provisions and then found a quiet location where I could make up some Q's before crossing the river into Okanogan. We headed north to Nespelum on the Colville reservation before turning east again. We only netted 16 Q's in that county.

Ferry County is another long trip through a mountainous pass. Because this was a rainy weekend, we actually ended up in the clouds before dropping down to the Columbia and the Inchelum/Gifford ferry. I always enjoy that crossing and marvel at the difference in the water levels between Spring and Fall. I had been telling Jim K7ND about my near collision with a turkey in Inchelum in 2015. I don't think we had gone more than 5 miles into Stevens County before we nearly had the main course for this year's Thanksgiving dinner. We ended up encountering several turkey flocks as we went through Stevens County. It was hard concentrating on the computer instead of watching the road for wayward fowl.

We continued through to Pend Orreille then finally south towards Spokane. Spokane has been an issue for me in the past. It takes a long time to get through and isn't the rarest of counties. This year, we cut through just the northwest corner of Spokane. backtracking into Stevens, and then dropping into Lincoln for a long drive south towards I-5. It worked out well and we got to spend a fair amount of time in Lincoln as opposed to years in the past. When we hit I-5, we headed west towards a setting sun and a meal and bed in Ritzville. After getting settled at the motel, I left Jim at the room and headed out for a quiet spot to do some 80M work. I would have liked a county line but they were too far away so I just went a couple miles out of town and parked beside the road. It was quiet and it was DARK.

Remember that cooling fan? I had no issues with heat all day. In fact, I was starting to wonder if I even needed that fan. However, out there in the dark, I sort-of forgot to turn it on. I was 10 Q's into the middle of my 80M run when the sending stopped. At first, I thought

I had locked up the computer by being on 80M. I was just about ready to reboot it when I looked over at the radio... HIGH TEMP FAULT. Arghh!!! I turned on the fan, reset the radio, and watched the temperature drop like a rock even on slow speed. When I was done, I had put over 30 Q's on 80M in the log for Adams. I went back to the motel and dropped off to sleep quickly.

The original plan had been to start out Sunday morning about 8:30 and continue working Adams halfway to Whitman. Instead, I decided that we had worked Adams well enough and we should start off on the Whitman line at 9AM. That would make it easier to make our goal of hitting all 20 counties. In the past we would go all the way through Whitman to Asotin before working back westward. It's a long trip for a not-so-rare county. This time we headed straight to Garfield, then to Asotin, then back tracked through Garfield to Columbia County. Garfield is a tougher county to work as the route travels along hills and canyons. When done we had 20 Whitman Q's, 40 in Garfield, over 30 in Asotin, and over 20 in Columbia when we stopped for lunch.

We hit Walla Walla about 1PM local and we only had 4 hours to do the next 5 counties. We stopped in a quiet park in Franklin because you can zip through that county in 15 minutes. Then it was on through Benton, climbing up into the Horse Heaven Hills towards a corner of Klickitat where we sat in a vineyard for 30 minutes. Finally, we headed home through Yakima with only 15 minutes left on the clock.

Everything worked like a charm (except for forgetting to turn on the fan once). Propagation was better than expected and I actually saw rain in eastern Washington for the first time. Europe and Japan (usually Atsushi at JA1YNE) were surprises though usually as ESP QSO's. We had some stations follow us around for dozens of contacts. I tried 15M a number of times but only managed 6 contacts. When I got them on 15M, they were strong. I think there were more possibilities for 15M if others had gotten on. Being able to swap antennas back and forth quickly was a joy.

Salmon Run is a lot of fun at home or on the road. Give it a try someday.
