NEMCo is holding a Technician class in Kenmore starting February 19, 2019 and Mercer Island Radio Operators are holding a Technician class Starting on March 15, 2019.

<u>Around The Shack</u>

You light up my life! But caused so much RFI.

For months now, I've had this odd RFI on the 40M band. Every 22KHz was this "carrier' looking signal along with just a little extra noise in-between, shown here in the figure below.



Discussions on the Wednesday Night Tech Net were helpful and other Ham related research helped, but you know what they say? "Ask a hundred Ham's a guestion and get 101 different answers."

As you probably know, I seem to be a magnet for RFI. How many articles have I written now? Grow lights, kitchen lights, mag loop antenna for detection and now this? I need to move to a hill in the country. But until then, I will just endure and keep finding them and getting rid of them when I can.

This particular RFI problem was not super obvious to locate. Especially in the summer when the days are long. Once Daylight Savings time ended, that's when I really started to notice the problem and try and find it. After I found the problem, it was a big slap on the forehead with the accompanying DOH!

As I sat in my shack one night, I noticed the street light out my window. Recalling one of the comments from the Tech Net regarding street lights being a potential problem, I decided to pay attention to it.

Of course I had to wait until the weekend because by the time I get home from work, it's dark outside and the street light is already on.

Saturday evening rolls around and dusk is approaching. Dusk is also known as the Grey Line, for you Ham nerds out there. I turn on the IC-7300 and switch to 40 meters. Typical noise floor of S3 to S5 as seen here;



It's getting darker and I diligently watch the street light and waterfall. Finally the street light turns on and the noise starts as seen in the first pic. Gotcha! I kept track of this over the rest of the weekend and into the week. During the week, I could watch the light and noise turn off in the mornings. This verified that it was THAT street light as the other street lights close to me turn on and off at slightly different times.

So, I decided to call Seattle City Light and report it. Who knows, maybe they'll do something about it. Worth a try anyway. I go get the pole number and give them a jingle. The lady was very nice. I tell her about the RFI (had to give a tiny explanation what RFI was) and giver all the information she required. I also mention that the RFI is a violation of FCC Part 15 and 97 and that I am an Amateur Radio operator. I get a few "uh-ha", I see..." and "ok's" as I talk. We conclude our conversation and she mentions that she will get this reported to the appropriate people.

I decided that I was not going to hold my breath for this. However, to my surprise, just a few hours later she called me back! "I've escalated this issue to my manager and we'll get this looked at as soon as possible." I managed an astonished thank you.

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But alas, my RFI woes continued because not two days later, Typhoon Seattle ripped through the region and knocked out power to 350,000+ customers. I had this sinking feeling that I was pushed down the priority list a couple of notches.

The aftermath was cleaned up a couple of weeks later and I figure I'm a lost cause when my phone rings. It's my favorite lady from Seattle City Light!

She gave me a ticket number and said someone will be out to change the light within two weeks. Again, I managed an astonished thank you. The very next day, the crew chief called me and said they were at the pole. We talked for a little and he assured me they were going to change the light with a 24W LED.

I couldn't wait to get home from work and for dark to approach. By the time I got home, it was dark, but that didn't matter. On goes the rig and straight to 40 meters. "It's Gone!!" I'll be darned, it worked.

It is definitely nice those 22Khz RFI "thingies" are gone. Now, when the grey line comes and the street light turns on, it just lights up my life and not my waterfall.

My hat's off to Seattle City Light for not dropping the ball with me, to their efforts and to the reasonably speedy repair, in spite of the massive wind storm damage.

As I write this, we are 4 weeks from the Mike & Key Electronics Show and Swap Meet in Puyallup. Table sales are coming in daily; the first floor is long sold out and the second floor is about 3/4's full. Hopefully, the white stuff outside will be long gone by then.



What we need now are WORKERs.

For Friday, the biggest needs are in the Country Store and Security. Both of these are easy jobs physically (though security involves walking). However, those are the jobs needed after 2PM when we open to our vendors. Between 9AM and 2PM, we still have a need for many people to do Setup which include putting up 300 tables and 600 chairs. Note... we will feed you lunch during Setup.

On Saturday, the biggest needs are ticket sellers (one more each shift), ticket takers, Country store, and hospitality. Then, there is load-out and teardown which requires us to get all those tables put away and the vendors out the door in about 3 hours. ALL HANDS ON DECK!

You can volunteer at <u>https:/mkarc.ivolunteer.com/</u>. We also allow friends and relatives to participate so have them sign up too.

If you are new to the Club, I recommend being at the February meeting for the program. We will be discussing the logistics of the Swap Meet in detail. 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Swap Meet Primer

What is this Swap Meet thing-a-ma-gig coming up? For those that are new to the Club, this article is an attempt to provide relief from the blank stares I get when I ask if someone wants to sign up and work the event. It describes what the Swap Meet is, its importance to the Club, the level of support required, and the job categories involved.

What is it?

The Mike & Key Swap Meet is a one-day Hamfest held on a Saturday during the first part of March of each year. (For those who care about such things, it's the 10th full weekend of the year not counting weekends that includes New Year's Day.) This year, that will be March 9thth. It's held at the Pavilion Exhibition Building on the Washington State Fairgrounds in Puyallup. This is a two story building with 40,000 sg. feet of exhibition space. The event requires setting up over 300 tables and accommodating 600 sellers and their helpers. We typically draw 1700-1900 people through the door. While this is a one-day event for the public; for the Club, it requires an additional day of set-up on Friday. So, for many of us, it's a two day event. This Swap Meet will be our 38th event. After so many years, it's a tradition in the Pacific Northwest and arguably the largest Hamfest in the region... certainly in Washington State. We draw vendors from the entire West Coast and buyers from Canada, Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. (Ok, we even got a guy coming from Texas this year.)

Why do it?

Well, it's a heck of a lot of fun but primarily, it's a fundraiser for the Club's activities. Because of this event, we can keep the dues at a ridiculously low rate of \$12. It's been calculated that if we lost the Swap Meet and had to rely on dues alone that we would need to have dues in the \$60-70 range to maintain current levels. More likely, we would just have to de-fund a number of activities or charge members extra to participate. We also use the funds to help produce our yearly *Special Events and Information Guide* Booklet given away freely at the event and at the yearly Communications Academy event.

Club Support

Because all of our members benefit directly, it's really a responsibility of our members to participate in making this event happen. It takes a minimum of 120 people to run this event smoothly. We accept help from non-members too so if you can talk your spouse into it or have some reliable friends, we would be happy to include them in the worker community. All workers receive a badge that entitles them to be on the premises during setup hours just like the sellers. That gives you a head start on finding the best deals (a very nice perk if you've ever fought the crowds). We have a number of different

areas that require workers and they support all types of physical limitations. No area is any more important than another though some may require some expertise or onthe-job training. Members may signup using an on-line signup tool (<u>http://mkarc.ivolunteer.com</u>), sending email to <u>n7wa@arrl.net</u>, or catching me at a Club meeting. The on-line tool includes worker descriptions. Members are encouraged to work in several areas throughout the event.

Security - probably the simplest of worker assignments, it's important none-the-less. Your job depends on where you are assigned. However, it usually involves walking the aisles watching for people lifting covers off of tables and making sure everyone has a badge. From 8-9AM on Saturday, we need a large contingent of security at the entrance doors prior to letting the crowd in. We do hire two professional guards to provide security out at the ticket booths and to handle issues that might require their level of help. Security is active during setup hours (2PM-7:30PM Friday, 5:30-AM-8:30AM Saturday). Physically, you should be able to stand and/or walk for extended periods of time. We also have positions sitting down in front of the loading doors watching for badges.

Tickets – working the ticket booths does requires some ability at handling money (making change) and the ability to work under pressure. There will usually be two of you in a booth. We sell tickets from 8AM - 2PM Saturday. Because you are handling Club funds, this position is limited to Club members and their spouses. There are two other ticket related jobs – taking tickets and hand stamping. Those jobs are open to all but are outdoors so be prepared for the weather of the day.

Announcing – a willingness to interface with the public is good here. You'll be answering questions and providing limited announcements. Announcing is also where the talk-in station is located and the door prizes are drawn. No physical requirements here, you can sit indoors the entire time. Announcing is active from 2PM-7PM Friday and 5:30AM-3PM on Saturday.

Country Store – this is our consignment area. People bring in items here when they don't have enough to fill their own table. (Workers can place items in the Country Store too and sell them commission free.) A working knowledge of equipment is helpful in this area and you will be dealing with the public. The Country Store runs from 2PM-7PM Friday and 6:00AM-3PM on Saturday. No physical limitations.

Loading Dock – this area requires the most number of people. You need to be able to work in a team environment. There is some physical labor required here. We don't load people's equipment but we do move

empty pallets by hand and full pallets using "jacks". You are working mostly under cover outdoors. This job takes a bit of on-the-job training to learn the system but it's not difficult. You will be interfacing with our vendors and a good attitude is important as they can be cranky at times. The loading dock is active from 2PM-7:30PM Friday, 5:30-AM-8:30AM Saturday, and 3PM-6PM Saturday.

Registration/Traffic Control – Registration hands out vendor packets at the Gold Gate (walk-ins) and Orange Gates (drive-ins). All of the jobs require being outdoors in the weather and possibly standing for extended periods of time. (These are usually very special people but highly appreciated.) This area is active from 2PM-7:30PM Friday, 5:30-AM-8:30AM Saturday, and 3PM-6PM Saturday (loadout).

Setup – On Friday, from 9AM to 2PM, a large number of workers are needed to help setup the Pavilion. This mostly involves setting up 300+ tables and 400+ chairs. It's physical work but important. We work in pairs (mostly) to reduce the burden. Also, at this time, Announcing, Registration, and Country Store will be getting ready to open at 2PM. We do provide lunch at noon on Friday for our setup workers.

Teardown – often forgotten, we need just as many people to help teardown the tables starting at 3PM on Saturday as we did setting up on Friday. If you aren't involved in performing loading dock duties or traffic control, we need you to stay on and help teardown and cleanup. Yes, we are all tired but it needs to be done.

Hospitality – We have our own Hospitality Suite for workers only. Michelle does a good job of laying on the feed bag but it really takes several people to get it setup and the food flowing. It's indoor work, and if you have an interest contact Michelle, WB7AYU michelln@oz.net.

Letting the Smoke Out submitted by Michael, N7WA

This year, I decided to get back into SO2R (Single Op Two Radio) for the North American QSO Party. I used my Elecraft K3 base station and pulled in my KX3 mobile rig from the truck.

I did a fair amount of testing to determine that some of the combinations weren't as clean as I wanted (like getting into 20M with one radio when running on 40M with the other). This is normal and I have some band pass filters I made a number of years ago that I am pretty proud of. To make it quick and easy, for this test, I

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installed them out on the 2x6 switch outside. They did a great job during the contest.

A week later, a DXpedition came on line (Sierra Leone) that I wouldn't mind working.

I sat in front of the rig and tuned up the amplifier to about 1000 watts. The SWR meter started screaming at me. It does that when the SWR gets too high - it'll even cut off the amplifier. Huh? what's up. I check for the right antenna selections and tuned the amp again. More screaming.

That's when it hit me. My beautiful 40M bandpass filter - which was designed to handle 200 watts - was probably toast by now. I went outside and could smell the results when I got to the switch. Argghh!

Fortunately, I was able to determine the problem pretty quickly. One capacitor that was black and charred was a pretty good indicator. There were some others as well. I did have to order some replacements which was a pain (and expensive because they were high tolerance high voltage caps). However, once they were soldered in, all seems well.
