AN OPINION

In the Mike and Key Radio Club I have seen members come and go. The "turnover" has really been high. If we were running a company, we'd be putting out a stack of bucks just retraining new employees. I don't suppose the analogy is appropriate, but then, maybe it is worth a few words.

Why do we see such a turnover? After a few terms in one or another office in the club, I think I can offer one opinion. It seemed to me that there were literally dozens of reasons why folks dropped their club membership. I won't attempt to list them because you've probably heard them too. Yet I think that the lack of participation -- or lack of understanding that there is a "job for every member" -- is really one reason why we have such a turnover.

I'm going to try to list as many jobs as I can that are reasonable, exciting, worthy, beneficial, helpful, educational, meritorious, rewarding, and will do something for someone -- mostly yourself.

First, we have the "Officers" of the club. Each job is very important and needs attention if the office is going to succeed -- and the club too. Takes 5 positions. Then there are the "Trustees" who set the club policies. A good job that takes good people and produces a good club. 5 positions + Radio Club Officer = 6. Total so far: 11. Then we have the "Editor" who ought to have a couple of assistants to help get the paper typed, collated, stapled, addressed, and mailed. 3 positions. Total so far: 14. Takes at least 2 folks to buy donuts for the monthly meeting, takes at least 2 to make sure the coffee is ready, takes 2 more to set up the meeting room and takes 2 more to tear down, plus 2 more to help clean up. Total 10 for these jobs. New total: 39. Annual Christmas party should have another 20 people to make it a success. Total now: 59. Field Day organization and planning takes at least 5 if you don't consider all the other jobs like operators, and chairmen, and gophers, etc. Grand total now: 64. Public Service radio jobs (Bike-A-Thons, Seafairs Parades, Folk Festival, etc.) Takes at least 50 people to do the job if each of the 50 does at least 3 or more public service tasks per year. (Some already do much more). Total now: 114. Annual banquet and installation of officers should have another 8 people to really do the job up right. New total: 132.

There are another bunch of jobs that need attention in the club every year and I haven't even covered other possibilities like amateur license classes, "Santa Talks", Public Relations, Public News writer, Puget Sound Council of Amateur Radio Clubs, and migharsh what else?

The whole point of this opinion or editorial is to just point out that there are a number of jobs in our club that are always there, are always needing attention and YOU CAN FILL ONE OF THOSE JOBS!!!!!!!!!!

If each member of our club only took one ONE job and did it for a whole year, we would still not have enough members to take care of everything. Someone would have to do two or three jobs just to keep the club running. I like the idea that ONE PERSON-ONE JOB could be made to work. Unfortunately, there are many in the club who don't even have one job and yet we have many who come into the club for a year or two and then drop out. The turnover is terrific and I believe that the biggest part of the problem is because each of us think someone else will do the job. We just don't want to get involved. Heck, involvement is part of living. It's part of enjoying life. Involvement is not embarrassing -- it's doing something that only you can do. Who cares if someone makes an occasional error or goofs it up?

The fact that YOU are doing something for the benefit of yourself and helping others far overshadows the goof. And if you think you can do a job better than someone else-- then do it!!!! Don't stand back and wait to be asked -- jump up and take the job on. Get some helpers and make our club a really potent club in the Puget Sound area. You can do it. ONE MAN - ONE JOB.



.....FOR A GREAT FISH FRY.....

- 3 green onion, chopped (or 1/4 cup freeze-dried chives)
- 1 T chopped parsley or dried parsley flakes
- 2 T lemon juice
- 1/4 t pepper
- 6 trout, cleaned
- seasoned salt
- 6 slices bacon
- 1/2 cup buttermilk baking mix
- 2 T yellow cornmeal
- lemon wedges

Combine the onion, parsley, juice, and pepper; set aside. Sprinkle trout cavities with the salt, then spread each with some of the onion mixture. In a wide frying pan over medium heat, crisply fry the bacon. Lift out and drain. Reserve pan drippings, leaving 2 or 3 T in the pan. Combine baking mix and cornmeal on a piece of waxed paper. Coat both sides of trout in the mixture. Cook half the trout at a time, 4 to 5 minutes on a side or until golden and fish flakes. Top each with bacon and serve with lemon wedges. Use additional bacon drippings to cook remaining trout. Serves 6.

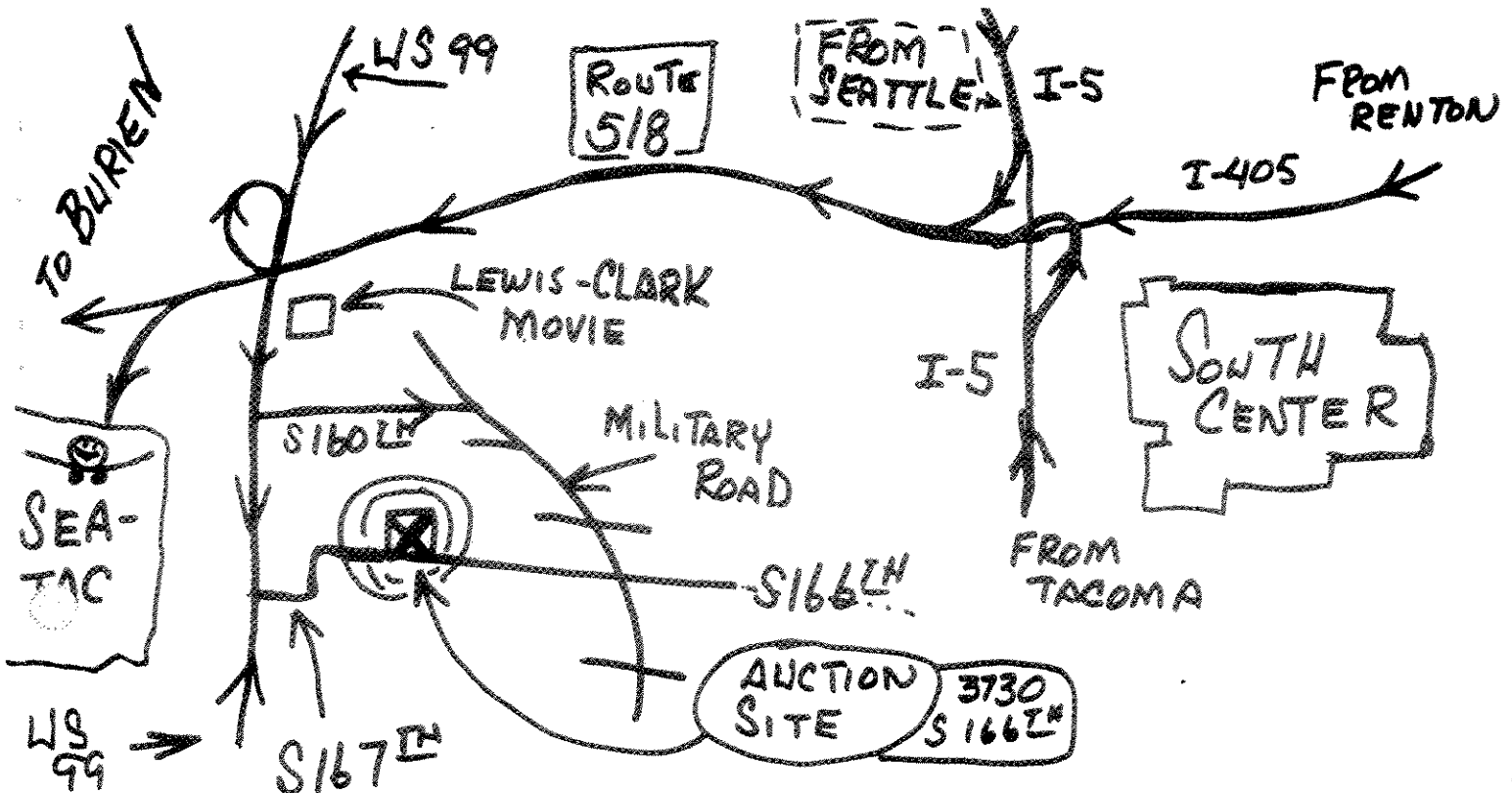

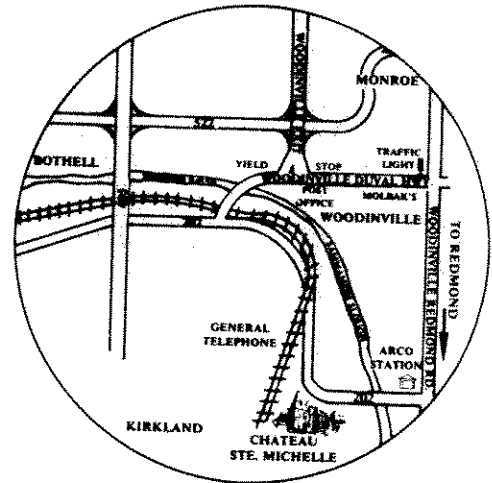
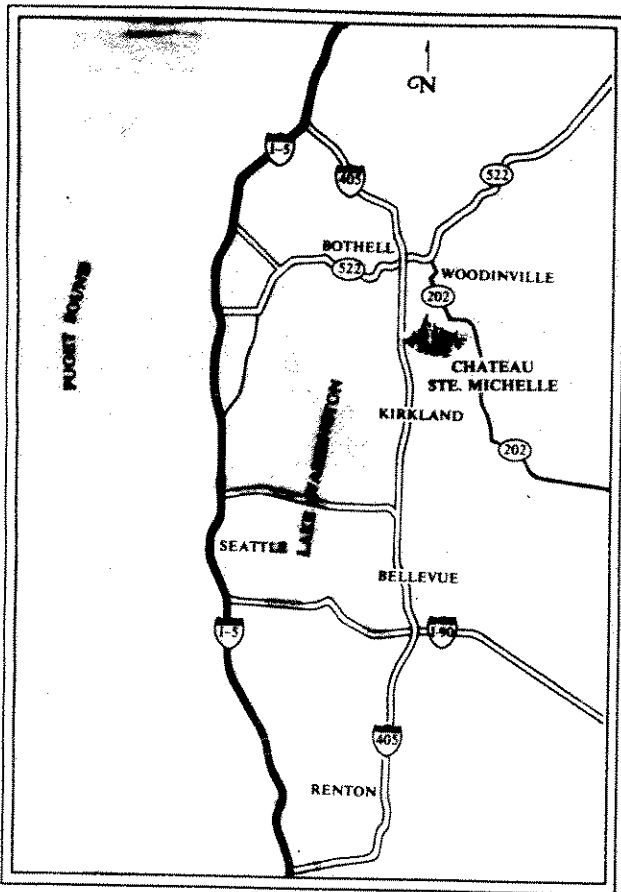
