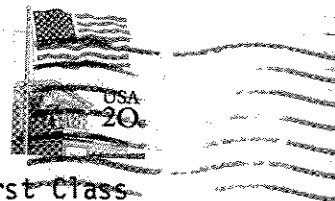

2 METER REPEATER- - - - -

At the beginning of this term of office we decided the Mike & Key members needed to get to know each other better. We felt that seeing each other only once a month was not good enough. One thought was that if we had a common meeting ground on the air it would promote the familiarity that was our goal. It seemed that a 2 M repeater would be the most accessible mode for the majority of members. We discussed the fact that we had a 6 M repeater for Club use, but it does require getting a 6 M radio. We would be trying to get people to buy another radio in economically poor times, so we thought "try 2 M - everybody has 2 M". So we wrote a letter last August to the WWARA requesting a coordinated pair or possibly buying a current operation. Up to this point we are still waiting. The WWARA has discussed it, but repeater frequencies on 2 M are "extremely difficult to come by". The WWARA requested information from us if we were still interested. At the January meeting we had a motion regarding a 2 M repeater. Those present were in favor of pursuing it further, so a letter will be sent confirming our interest. There are still other options open. The 6 M repeater (52.37-53.37) is working well with even more improvements on the horizon. Maybe even in the future where might be a 2 M link incorporated, who knows.

REPRINT FROM ARRL LETTER

World Radio Amateurs Day has been established by IARU as April 18, but no plan for its recognition is known. In the absence of other proposals, and to deliberately avoid a contest activity, the New Zealand Association of Radio Transmitters offers the following suggestion:

"This is not a contest, but an activity in which every radio amateur can take part and should be encouraged to do so. The idea is to recognize the founding of the International Amateur Radio Union on April 18, 1925 by doing something you have not done before, between 1200 UTC on April 17 and 1200 UTC on April 19 each year. These dates represent the start and finish of the day of April 18 at the International Date Line, and are chosen to show unification of all radio amateurs by observing the same period for this global activity.

"Your special activity could be to work new stations, to try a new mode or a new band, to at least listen to a satellite, to build a piece of gear, or just to exchange greetings with someone new. Anything to make World Radio Amateurs Day a "special day" in your amateur radio experience. There are no prizes, no awards, no certificates, just the satisfaction of knowing that you have reactivated some amateur spirit; that you have recognized World Radio Amateurs Day and acknowledge the debt you owe to the International Amateur Radio Union for its achievements on your behalf. World Radio Amateurs Day need do no more than that for its aim to have been achieved.

"So go to it, do your particular thing, individually or as one of a group, to make April 18th a very special day on the amateur radio calendar. April 18, 1985 is the Diamond Jubilee of the founding of IARU. Let 1984 be an experimental year leading up to mass participation in 1985." -- ZL2AMJ

ARRL Counsel, Chris Imlay, N3AKD, will be featured on the Teleconference Radio Net, scheduled for 8:30 p.m. EST, March 8. Imlay will talk about "Amateur Radio and the Law," with attorneys Jim O'Connell, W9WU, and Joe Merdler, N6AHU.

The Teleconference Radio Net is a service of the Honeywell Amateur Radio Clubs of Minneapolis, Billerica and Phoenix. Further information about the Net can be obtained for an s.a.s.e. addressed to Rick Whiting, W0TN, 4749 Diane Drive, Minnetonka, MN 55343.

Although the official "stock" copies of "Amateur Radio's Newest Frontier" are only now available for distribution, several advance copies have circulated to people having special needs. As might be expected, the hams are ecstatic, but more importantly the non-ham public is reacting with enthusiasm.

Officials at NASA Hq. in Washington have asked permission to reproduce and distribute copies through their official system. Broadcast officials previewing it have labeled it "dynamic and very professionally done." It is clear that we have a winner! (You can thank Roy Neal, K6DUE, and his team for this one.)

If you would like to borrow a copy, write to the ARRL film library and specify whether you need VHS or U-Matic along with the date needed -- but be prepared for a delay, because we already have a waiting list. If you want to purchase a copy, the price for VHS is \$25, and for U-Matic, \$35. Both prices are postpaid in the U.S. (foreign delivery extra). The Radio Society of Great Britain will be making PAL versions available in both VHS and Beta formats. Contact the RSGB (Alma House, Cranborne Rd., Potters Bar, Herts. EN6 3JW, England) for PAL version information.

The Norfolk, VA, FCC Office collected a \$1,000 forfeiture from R.G. Church, a Richmond CBer. Church was fined after FCC engineers found that he was operating on unauthorized frequencies.

Although the Commission deleted CB licensing requirements (see Vol. 2, No. 10), users are still bound by the Commission's rules and will be prosecuted for violations.

The Department of State sent a Telex on January 31 asking ITU to publish the willingness of the U.S. administration to enter into temporary third party agreements with any country participating in the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. ITU did so in its Notification #1195, dated February 10, 1984. This would allow amateurs to handle messages for the Olympic athletes whose countries respond affirmatively to the U.S.'s offer. Dex Anderson, W4KM, has been a prime mover in the effort.

FCC 1983 yearend figures for 1983 show 411,626 individual Amateur Radio operators licensed by the Commission. This is an increase from 410,304 for yearend 1982, or 0.32%. In the same period, ARRL Full Membership in the U.S. increased by 2.5%.

In response to Minute 48 of the ARRL Board Meeting in Houston last fall, the Communications Department has produced a draft proposal on rules for conducting Morse code speed championships. The draft is now being reviewed by a number of known experts in the field. Once their comments have been assimilated, the completed document will define specifically the standards for conducting ARRL sanctioned code contests. It promises to be a very comprehensive document.

Ohio State Representative Robert Netzley of Laura, Ohio introduced House Bill 713 into the Ohio State Legislature on February 22, 1984. If the bill is passed it will modify the Ohio revised code to give some protection to amateurs from restrictive antenna ordinances. The bill is a result of efforts of Dayton Amateur Radio Association member Terry Falknor, N8EEO, who has been working with Representative Netzley for some time. To succeed in getting the bill out of committee for vote and then getting it passed will require that the amateurs of the state put a great effort into working with their local representatives. The Dayton Amateur Radio Association is planning a mailing to amateurs in the state alerting them to the bill and asking their support for the legislation.

An interview with astronaut Dr. Owen Garriott, W5LFL, will be the pre-net audio on the March 8, 1984, North American Teleconference Radio Net (T.R.N.). This will be one of the first opportunities for amateurs to hear W5LFL describe his experience and reaction to his historic operation from space aboard the Space Shuttle Columbia. The interview was conducted and recorded on February 21 for the T.R.N. by Steve Bauer, KCØHF.

T.R.N. pre-net audio begins at 8:15 PM. Eastern Standard Time. The national net begins at 8:30. Some T.R.N. gateway stations do not carry the pre-net audio. For a list of stations carrying the T.R.N., send an s.a.s.e. to WØTN, Call Directory address.

Call sign assignment reform is taking place in Russia. It's too complicated to cover here, but suffice it to say that it makes the U.S. system seem lovable. This subject, as well as little "snacks" on Amateur Radio in Russia, will be covered in USSR Tidbits, Number 20, published by Tom Frenaye, K1KI. Write to Tom (Box 62, Unionville, CT 06085) for more information. Please enclose an s.a.s.e. with your inquiry.

The FCC has released a new Amateur Radio license study guide. These new syllabi should be used in preparing for amateur exams, since they follow the actual tests fairly closely. The major differences are that now there are questions on the rules and regulations dealing with amateur test administration on the Advanced and Extra class exams. This new study guide (FCC PR Bulletin 1035) will be in April's QST.

IARU President Dick Baldwin, W1RU, attended the recently concluded First Session of the World Administrative Radio Conference for High-Frequency Broadcasting held in Geneva January 10 - February 11. Baldwin said of the conference, "There were no decisions which were adverse to the Amateur Radio Service. The conference adopted a resolution which urged broadcasters not to operate in the bands allocated to other services. It passed a resolution urging administrations to take steps not to create harmful interference (jamming). And it adopted a tentative agenda for 1986 which includes the statement that broadcasters should plan to stay within their allocated bands. If adhered to, all of these items would benefit the Amateur Radio Service."

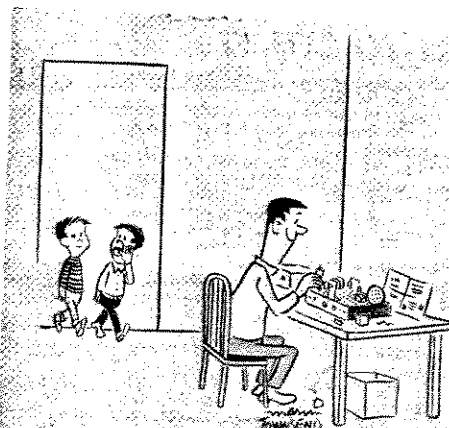
