*** ARRL DX TEST ***

The third weekend of February was the CW weekend for the ARRL DX contest. We put K7LED on the air once again from Fox Island. Those participating were KA7CSE, NT7J, WA7UVJ, W7EVS, and N7NW. We only operated 20 and 40 meters. Do to work and club meeting commitments we were unable to work the entire 48 hours but we had a lot of fun during the time we were able to operate.

The group arrived on the island about 1830 Friday and were got on 20 meters right away. The JA's were rolling in. Later we switched to 40 and worked some europe and more asia and pacific. Saturday morning I worked the 40 meter long path opening to europe before leaving for the club meeting and more work. 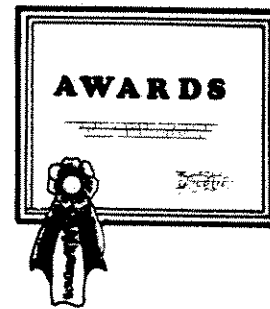

High quality video and audio existed and the attendees were favorably impressed. (One comment I heard was that our TV was better than ABC's coverage of the Olympics Hi Hi). The antenna had to be placed on the roof so Chuck found a stepladder that was a tad too short so Carolyne was invited to go up the ladder, but declined - so Chuck went up with Carolyne steadying the ladder----

At the close of the meeting, Archie comic books and lists of Radio Classes/Test locations were given to each Cub. Vic drove his motorhome equipped with a HF station so about 20 boys piled into the confined area and we had a nice QSO on 75 meters with a fellow in Sacramento and one in southern AZ. 8-10 boys talked to the Sacramento station. The boys got a real kick out of talking on the radio--they wanted me to call China!!

There is a REAL LARGE POOL of potential Hams in the age bracket of 8-12 years and amateurs are missing a good bet if we don't get into their midst with our ideas. I have two queries from other Cub Packs, so we will see what develops.

ARTICLE FROM THE "SPARKS"
PARS Newsletter - Feb., 1988

Jim Horn KA7GKP passed along an article which appeared in the Dec. 31 edition of the Tacoma News Tribune. A similar article also appeared in the Seattle Times. It mentioned a study by Dr. Samuel Milham, Jr., suggesting a link between exposure to electromagnetic fields and various forms of cancer. According to the January 15, 1988 issue of the ARRL Letter this is not the first time that Dr. Milham's studies have found their way into the press. A similar incident occurred in 1985. According to the ARRL, in the opinion of competent professionals, there were serious flaws in Dr.

Milham's methodology. The bottom line is that even the experts have disagreed as to the significance of the study, and it certainly did not establish a casual link between amateur radio operation and certain cancer incidences. The ARRL position on the original study was summed up in October, 1985 QST where an editorial was presented covering the study, as well as other pertinent data and findings. The ARRL Committee on Biological Effects of RF Energy will be reviewing the current article carefully. Weekend Beginners' Ham Class

Kirkland Washington

March 26 & 27

Obtain the Novice Voice-Class Amateur Radio License in just one weekend!

Both theory and code will be taught in this accelerated class. The new Novice Class license test will be administered in the last hour of the class. Previous background in the Morse Code or theory is not necessary. Ham radio demonstrations, as well as equipment recommendations, are an integral part of this weekend session. Recent FCC rule changes will now allow the Novice class operator to use voice on HF & VHF frequencies to stay in touch with the world and the community.

This course parallels the Federal Communications Commission and American Radio Relay League Novice class syllabus. A little prestudy and everyone passes!

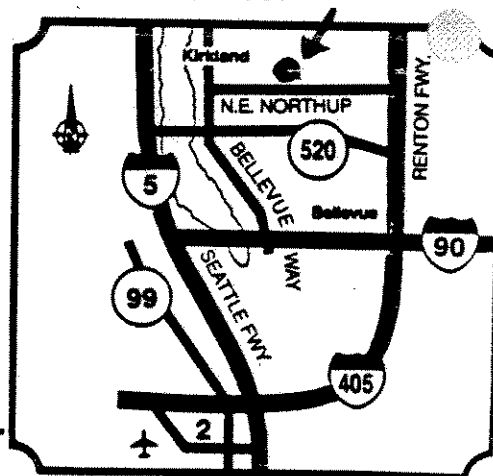

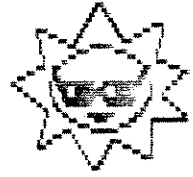
