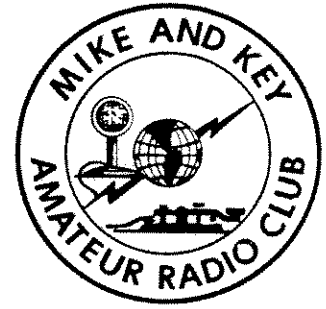
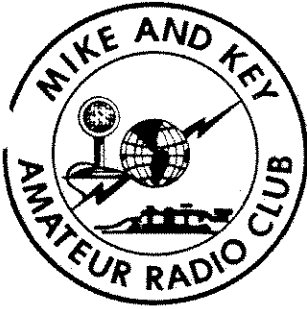

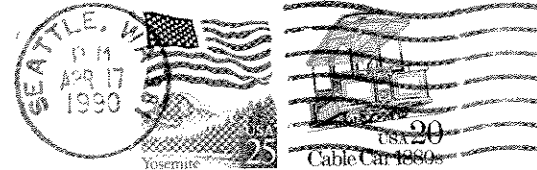

## FIELD DAY - JUNE 22/23/24

### Meeting

There will be a short FD meeting after the regular April meeting and I encourage all interested parties to attend. FD is only two short months away and I would like to get an idea of how large or small our effort is going to be, logistically speaking.

### Field Day Lodging

We rent two buildings at Fort Flagler so that people without camping gear can stay the weekend. One building has kitchen facilities. Occupants are required to help clean up, straighten up, after the close of operating time. This is a requirement-of-use of the buildings. There is room for 25 people on a SEE-ME-FIRST basis.

### FD Band Chairman

A more proper term might be station chairman as generally each bend has its own station. A band chair is the go-between between a group of people interested in operating a station and me. That group can be from a single person to however many friends you can enlist. The chairman is responsible for seeing that the station and antennas are assembled for operation on time. The chair is also responsible for coordinating an operating schedule. It's not really as big a job as it sounds, but it does carry some responsibility to the whole field day operation. The club owns some antenna equipment, available for FD use. Check with me. If you are still interested, be at the FD meeting or, if you cannot attend, have a representative put your name in along with band(s) of interest. Our club members have a lot of FD experience which I'm sure they will be glad to share.

### FD Camping

The club has reserved the group camp, again, this year. This area is available to tenters and RV owners alike. The regular camping areas are open by reservation only and I have forms for those who wish to use these facilities. Last year there was a proliferation (lots) of mosquitoes.

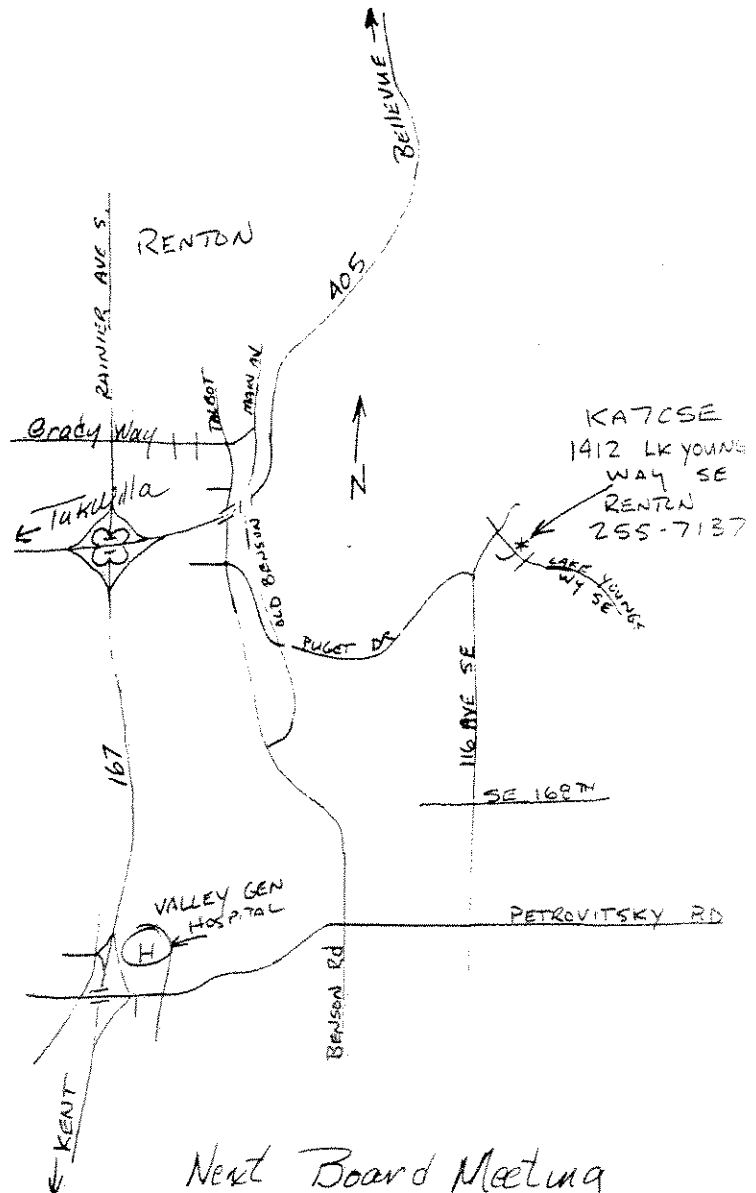
1990-91 OFFICERS  
MSK ARC

Section 97.115 of FCC Rules..authorizes an amateur station licensed by the FCC to transmit messages for a third party to any amateur station within the jurisdiction of a foreign government whose administration has made arrangements with the United States to allow amateur stations to be used for transmitting international communications on behalf of third parties.

The following officers were elected at the last general membership meeting:  
Pres. - Mike Dinkleman, WA7UVJ; Vice Pres. - Ralph Schumacher, WK7T; Rec. Sec. - Marina Zeutell, N7LSL; Treas. - Claire Laskey, KB7GEW; Activities Mgr. - Julian Williams, KA7MGB; Trustee #2 - Frank Krieger, KA7QHG; Trustee #4 - Brian Wood, KF7QF. Radio Officer, Editor and Trustees #1, 2, and 3 remain the same.

Here are the countries that have made the necessary arrangements with the U.S. to permit third-party messages:  
ANTIGUA 7 BARABUDA, ARGENTINA, AUSTRALIA, BELIZE, BOLIVIA, BRAZIL, CANADA, CHILE, COLOMBIA, FEDERAL ISLAMIC REPUBLIC OF COMOROS, COSTA RICA, CUBA, DOMINICA, DOMINICAN REPUBLIC, ECUADOR, EL SALVADOR, THE GAMBIA, GHANA, GRENADA, QUATEMALA, GUYANA, HAITI, HONDURAS, ISRAEL, JAMAICA, JORDAN, LIBERIA, MEXICO, FEDERATED STATES OF MICRONESIA, NICARAGUA, PANAMA, PARAGUAY, PERU, ST. CHRISTOPHER AND NEVIS, ST. LUCIA, ST. VINCENT AND THE GRENADINES, SIERRA LEONE, SWAZILAND, TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO, UNITED KINGDOM (SPECIAL EVENT STATIONS WITH CALL SIGN PREFIX GB FOLLOWED BY A NUMBER OTHER THAN 3), URUGUAY AND VENEZUELA. United Nations stations 4ULITU in Geneva, Switzerland and 4ULVIC in Vienna, Austria, have also made arrangements with the U.S. to permit third-party communication.

No amateur station regulated by the FCC shall transmit messages for a third party to any stations within the jurisdiction of any foreign government not listed above. This prohibition does not apply to a message for any third party who is eligible to be the control operator of the station.

## The *Communicator* License FCC proposes new codeless class of Amateur License

The Commission is proposing to amend its rules by establishing a codeless class of Amateur Operator license to be called the *Communicator Class*. The *Communicator Class* will be incorporated into a simplified licensing structure containing four ascending steps:

- 1) *Communicator*
- 2) General
- 3) Advanced
- 4) Extra

Current Technician and Novice Class operator licenses would be grandfathered indefinitely, with no new licenses issued for those license classes, but existing licenses could be modified or renewed.

The codeless operator class license would satisfy three major objectives. The first objective is to offer an entry level license for all persons who find telegraphy a barrier to pursuing the purpose of the amateur service. The second objective is to design a codeless license that can easily be implemented into the current licensing process. The third objective is to avoid any negative effect upon current licensees, the volunteer examiners who administer amateur examinations, or the Commission's workload.

The Amateur Service exists for the purpose of self-training, inter-communication and investigations to be carried out by duly authorized persons interested in radio technique solely with a personal aim, and without financial gain. Individuals seeking a license to operate an amateur station must prove that they can send correctly by hand and receive correctly by ear, text in Morse code signals. Although this requirement may be waived for an operator of an Amateur station transmitting on frequencies above 30 MHz, each of the five classes of operator licenses issued by the Commission requires the applicant to pass an examination in the international Morse code.

The *Communicator Class* operator license would not require knowledge of Morse code telegraphy messages. Privileges for the *Communicator Class* license would include all emission types. The *Communicator Class* license would replace two existing beginner operator classes and would simplify the amateur operator license structure.

The Commission would require applicants for the *Communicator Class* license to pass a 60 question written examination. The new question pool would be comprised of the questions from the two pools currently used in the Novice and Technician license examinations as well as the addition of new questions.

The proposed transmitter power for the *Communicator Class* would be 200 watts peak envelope power and the licensee's station would be eligible for a Group D call sign. Stations with *Communicator Class* control operators would not be permitted to transmit on the 2 and 6 meter VHF bands and the HF bands. The Commission is requesting comments on the effect of excluding *Communicator Class* licensees from the two VHF bands. Comments are also requested on the desirability of including the opportunity for *Communicator Class* licensees to experience on-the-air telegraphy operation on the HF bands. Additionally, a *Communicator Class* licensee who passes or receives credit for a telegraphy examination would be authorized the privileges of the Technician Class.

### Goodwill Games Ham Radio Communications Volunteers

Ted Weiler, N7LCG, is heading up the *only* Ham Radio Public Service operation for the 1990 Goodwill Games. Their task is to provide communications at Sea-Tac Airport and Tyee High School to help process the 10,000 people a day expected to arrive for the Goodwill Games. They need at least 200 volunteers (no minimum time commitment), to help with this task. The dates are from July 16th to August 5th. Radio equipment will be supplied if you don't have any. However, you *must* fill out an *official* Ham Radio Volunteer Application to participate, and you can get it from Ted Weiler, N7LCG, 17517 5th NE, Seattle, WA 98155, (206) 365-2103. This event is not related to any other event.

### 1990 Goodwill Games HF World Radiosport Team Championship

This is an official Cultural Exchange Program of the 1990 Goodwill Games and it is the first time a ham radio event of this type has ever been held! The Soviets, United States and six IARU countries are sending their very best HF contesters to compete "face-to-face" in Seattle in an international HF contest to take place on July 20th, 1990. The contest will be similar to the CQ World-Wide DX Contest, using CW and SSB, on 10, 15, 20, 40 and 80 meters. The Soviets are sending their teams with the same status as their other athletes! So, for the first time in history, amateur radio will have its *own* athletic event!

The purpose of all this is to recognize our top competitors as true "athletes" in their own right and afford them the same courtesy and recognition as athletes in other sports. If it is successful, we may see events of this type held in conjunction with other major athletic events, such as the Olympics. Through this competition, we are striving to raise the level of awareness about amateur radio (especially among young men and women), promote international goodwill and honor the skills of these competitors. This event is commercially sponsored by ICOM America, CQ Magazine, Ham Radio Outlet, U.S. Towers and MFJ, so there will be a great deal of publicity for amateur radio and we want everyone to share in it.

We are looking for hosts to house our competitors for three nights (there will be 36 competitors), and hams and spouses to participate in the parties and activities. 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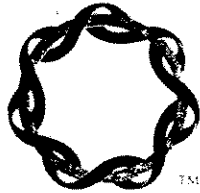

Dear Amateur:

March 19, 1990

The Seattle Organizing Committee of the Goodwill Games has identified an opportunity for amateur radio operators to work on the Goodwill Games as HAMS.

Between July 16 and August 5, there will be over 10,000 Goodwill Games travelers passing through the Seattle-Tacoma Airport. Over 2,000 in one day! All of these people will need to be met, transported and have their credentials verified. The operation will be carried out by a large group of Goodwill Games volunteers, coordinated by 11 supervisory personnel at the airport and at Tye High School (the Accreditation Center).

A radio system, using the amateur VHF and UHF frequencies, will be used to link these officials allowing the officials to rapidly communicate with each other and respond to urgent situations or sudden changes in schedules.

A ham will be assigned to each of the 11 officials as his or her "shadow". The shadow's responsibility will be to monitor the radio. When there is traffic requiring attention, they will alert the official and handle the traffic as needed. This will allow the administrators to focus on their jobs without having to worry about what is happening on the radio. In addition to the shadows, there will be at least one, and possibly two, net control operators.

Coverage is needed for 16 hours a day, seven days a week, from July 16 through August 5. We will break this up into two, four or eight shifts per day, or some variation or mix of these, depending on the number of hams that volunteer. In addition, there will be mandatory training and orientation sessions prior to the start of the Games.

**THERE IS NO MINIMUM NUMBER OF HOURS REQUIRED!!!**
