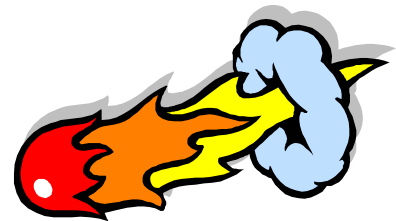

Pacific Northwest VHF Society

VHF, UHF and Microwave weak-signal enthusiasts in the Pacific Northwest have formed a new society to promote more interest and activity in weak-signal operation on the bands above 50 MHz. The new organization will focus on VHF-and-up weak-signal activity in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and British Columbia.

Announcement of the new society came at the 2001 Pacific Northwest VHF Conference in Tacoma, Washington, on September 22. Lynn Burlingame, N7CFO, will serve as President of the new society and Jim Aguirre, W7DHC, will handle the Secretary-Treasurer duties. A board of directors is currently being formed. Board representation will follow the ARRL and RAC section format, with directors from each of the five sections in the Pacific Northwest; British Columbia, Idaho, Oregon, Eastern Washington and Western Washington.

Charter memberships in the new organization will be available through October 31, 2001. Membership numbers will be issued, with "Charter" members receiving special "C-prefix" number. There is a one-time membership fee of \$10.00. While there are currently no annual dues, provisions for them have been made in the society's constitution and by-laws should they be needed in

the future. Once the charter membership period has expired, the membership number sequence will continue, but without the C-prefix. A membership application form can be downloaded in pdf format at <http://pw1.netcom.com/~n7cfo/pnwsociety/PNWVHFS.pdf>.

While the focus of the organization will be on Pacific Northwest activities and interests, anyone interested in weak-signal VHF, UHF and microwave operation is invited to become a member. For the most part, society "business" will be conducted electronically and at the annual meeting each September.

Workshops, seminars, operating activities and social gatherings will be held in various locations throughout the Pacific Northwest from time to time during the year. Consideration is also being given to sponsoring a regional award recognizing technical and operating achievements in the Pacific Northwest. Details will be forthcoming.

The !0000 Trick. Does it really stop viruses?

There is a tip/trick for the MS Outlook/Outlook Express address book to help stop the spread of viruses. That tip involved setting up a "fake" address book contact called "!0000". While this tip still has merit, here is some information I just found on this subject.

From the Virus Myths web site:

An anonymous, but enterprising, user began forwarding an email to others outlining a simple trick to prevent some mass-mailing email worms from sending from your computer. This easy tip involves adding the bogus contact "!0000" to the Windows Address Book. The premise is that when the virus tries to send itself out to everyone in the address book, the mail client will falter on the bogus address and the attempt to send will fail. Of course, this assumes the virus intends to do a "send all" in the first place. Many of the modern day viruses prefer to randomly select individual addresses or supplement the addresses with those found cached on the system. "In other words, the tip will only be effective in limited cases".

The only way I know how to prevent infecting your computer with a virus is:

- never insert a floppy diskette in your computer
- never install software of any kind
- give up the Internet and Email

Of course, this is ridiculous.....

However, you can be very safe if:

- you do not open email from people you do not know, or with odd subjects
- you do not open attachments that you did not expect to receive in advance
- you do not use the Preview pane in Outlook to preview email
- you have anti-virus software installed
- you keep your anti-virus software up-to-date, with the latest version and definition files
- you have the latest browser with updates and/or security patches
- you have a firewall like ZoneAlarm installed

Black Eye for Amateurs?

I thought I would share this with the group for future consideration. Today was a less than stellar day for public relations of amateur radio.

Today was the day of the XYZ Association walk-a-thon; the "organizer" of the amateur radio operators had confirmed with the Director of the XYZ walk that there would be at least six radio operators there... we had a sum total of one, me. To flesh out the saga a bit more, I'll give you events leading up to today's fiasco.

Back in January I was approached by one of my friends about getting a team of radio operators together to help with the traffic control issues (both vehicular and people); I then listed the event in our Public Service Events booklet for distribution at the Flea Market. In August, I heard from another ham that they had already been working with XYZ on communications (which was fine with me if they wanted to do the coordination). As such, I forwarded any contacts that I had from the Public Service to them (of which there had been only one).

On Thursday, the Director of the XYZ walk had confirmed with the other organizer the date, time, and the number of radio operators that were expected (six, but we could have used at least ten). Unfortunately, when today arrived, the communications team was a no show (I was there and helped setup the course and direct traffic from 6:00AM to about 2:00PM).

To put it mildly, the director of XYZ was angry and the captain of the traffic crew (my friend) was irate as well. I tried to do as much damage control as I could but the feeling I have is that they may not want anything to

do with amateur radio in the future; their main discussion after the event was that they plan on looking into commercial radios or donated cell phones for future events. The even bigger downside of this is that I have worked with these fund raising organizations in the past and all of them DO talk to each other about event planning and problems that they have run into.

What's to be done about all this now is the BIG question. I have offered my services as the coordinator for next year, if they even will allow amateur radio at all next year. I don't know how big of a ripple this will cause in the pond for public service but I don't think it will bode very well for us. If anyone has any ideas, thoughts or suggestions on what we can do in the way of damage control at this point; PLEASE share them with the Board and the Public Service Committee; I would hate to see all amateur radio public service volunteers shunned because there was lack of planning/participation.

One suggestion that I have is that we need to have MANY MORE people involved in public service events...if we had had more response from amateurs to the call for volunteers we may have had a few show up that were paying attention to the date and time of the event even if they had not received the proper feedback from the communications coordinator.

The second suggestion would be that people who coordinate these events need to stay on top if it. I have volunteered for a few events and I have found that I have sent a message to the volunteer coordinator and not received ANY acknowledgement that they have even received my message (I wish I could say this is unusual, but in my experience so far in the last year I have only received one message back and that was two days before the event giving me the talk-in frequency). When a volunteer comes forward they NEED TO BE ACKNOWLEDGED at that time and then kept in the communications loop as to what the planning is.

OK, I'll end my diatribe for now. But I hope that we can address this issue collectively.

IARU Calls for End to Morse Requirement From the ARRL

Saying that it was "setting aside any previous relevant decisions," the International Amateur Radio Union Administrative Council recently resolved that IARU policy supports "the removal of Morse code testing as an ITU requirement for an amateur license to operate on frequencies below 30 MHz." The Council further resolved to urge member societies--as an interim measure--to seek Morse code testing speeds "not exceeding five words per minute." The resolution was adopted during the IARU Administrative Council meet-

ing October 6-8 in Guatemala City, Guatemala, which followed the 14th General Assembly of IARU Region 2.

The Council's Morse resolution took into consideration the approval--without opposition--of ITU-R Recommendation M.1544. That document sets out the minimum qualifications of radio amateurs. The Council also said it recognizes that Morse code "continues to be an effective and efficient mode of communication used by many thousands of radio amateurs" but that Morse code proficiency as requirement for an HF amateur license "is no longer relevant to the healthy future of Amateur Radio."

Even though some have said to stop sending hardcopies, there is language in the Bylaws that could be interpreted as requiring that hard copies of all Club Documents be sent irregardless.

Last month, I went before the Board and asked that the Bylaws be changed to allow a member to stipulate alternative means of delivery when it comes to Club documents. The form of delivery must be acceptable to the Board and the member. If no form of delivery is desired or indicated by a member, the US Postal Service remains the default.

While the new Bylaw indicates electronic mail as

a possibility, I don't know what the future holds and if holographic imaging (whatever that is) becomes the norm someday, the new Bylaw proposal is open to it as long as both sides (Board and member) allow it.

The Board has recommended acceptance of the new Bylaw. If and when the Club agrees, I will accept official requests to change delivery methods from those who desire it. Electronic delivery does have it's advantages. You'll get the Relay before the hardcopies are even printed, it saves the Club more than a buck each, and the graphics come out in color.

I have stuck with Acrobat's PDF format which is the standard these days (in my estimate) and the reader is available free of charge. You can find examples of past work on the Club Web page. Just think, by next April, you should be able to store a whole years worth of Relay's on a CD.
