FleaMarket Workers Needed

(Begging has commenced)

Well, this is my annual begging article. At this writing, there are about 50 people signed up to work the Fleamarket. We really need 100 volunteers and 120 would be better. The area in the worst shape is the Public Announcing booth – all we have is the Chairperson and two others that have committed to a shift late Saturday. No one has signed up for Talk-in. No one has signed up for Country Store. We are short on people to sell tickets and the pallet crew is vastly understaffed.

This event generates the majority of our annual operating budget. Without this event, there would be no repeater and no Field Day. Social events (when we can find someone to chair them) would have to go away unless participants were willing to pony up quite a few more dollars. Dues would have to be raised simply to rent the Salvation Army building we have our meetings in.

Let's do the math (based on the proposed 2009 budget). We are budgeting to get \$8,500 for next years operations from Fleamarket proceeds. That's on top of the \$1,800 in dues we collect from members. If the Fleamarket was to go away (and it will if we can't get enough workers), it would be up to the members to raise that additional \$8,500 if they wanted to keep the same level of services. The way I do the math, we have about 150 people paying \$12 a year to get to that \$1800. If you want 150 people to raise \$10300 (1800+8500), that's \$69 a year. I'll admit to some fudge factor because some families are paying family rates but I think the premise is valid.

Of course, at that point, membership would plummet, services would be cut and the premier Amateur Radio organization we know would simply disappear. Oh, the Club would probably still exist, it would just be a run-of-the-mill organization with few resources or attributes that would make it stand out from the crowd. Wouldn't it be a lot more fun and productive to volunteer for the Fleamarket? You become part of event that is renown throughout the Pacific Northwest, you get first dibs on all that stuff, and you help keep dues LOW (that's pretty important in the current economic reality).

If you can't make the January meeting, please email me with your sign up request. If you are a new member and you're scared to volunteer, talk to me. (In 28 years, we haven't lost, killed, or maimed a newbie yet). If you are old member and haven't signed up, why aren't you showing the leadership we need? Already signed up? Maybe there is another job you could sign up for in a different area after you get tired of walking the aisles? It's your club, you joined it... it's time to support it.

Country Store – Its Time is Coming

God, I love the smell of musty vintage radios in the morning! Well, not really, but I do enjoy all the commotion, the fellowship, and the bargaining that goes on during our annual Flea Market.

The Country Store has been a successful part of our Flea Market for years. Last year, for example, some 30 sellers on average pocketed more than \$150 for items they will probably never miss. And many buyers walked away knowing they got a bargain price on items they didn't realize they needed!

The Store's success depends on your help. Whether your goal is to make a few bucks or you simply want to make room for more gear, consider selling your items in the Store. It's time to make your shopping list and to collect the items around the shack that you no longer need. We all have things we should "recycle."

Maybe it's time to give up on that antenna project that you never finished and offer it to someone with more time and interest. Or maybe that TNC or old HF rig will help a new ham get hooked on digital modes or HF operating. And selling your stuff through the Store beats spending the day standing in front of your own rented table. As an added bonus, there is no selling commission for badged Flea Market volunteers.

You can list up to 10 items for sale by completing the consignment form. Fill out the form complete with suggested and minimum prices. Then bring your items through registration on Friday between 2:00 and 7:30 pm or on Saturday anytime after 5:30 am. Most reasonably-priced electronic and amateur equipment, software, and notebook computers draw lots of interest. But please don't list any CRT monitors or anything else you aren't willing to pick up if it doesn't sell.

Experienced Country Store staff will display and sell your items. If they sell, you can expect your check for the proceeds within a week or two. In the event they do not sell, you can pick up your items personally from the Country Store after 3:00 pm or have them delivered on a pallet to your waiting truck in the loading area. You will need an admission ticket to attend the Saturday event unless you enter to retrieve your unsold items after 3:00 pm.

Whether you are a veteran of past Country Store sales or a willing newcomer, we can use your help. Knowledge of electronics and amateur gear and its value is very helpful, but not an absolute requirement. So don't let that discourage you from asking for an assignment.

==> ONE MODE DOWN, TWO TO GO!

With the advent of the ARRL's Triple Play Award <<http://www.arrrl.org/news/stories/2008/12/05/10490/>>, on-air participation has reached a level of excitement not seen in recent years. This new, exciting award is available to all amateurs who confirm contacts with each of the 50 states using three modes for each state: CW, phone and RTTY/digital. All 150 contacts must be made on or after the January 1, 2009 and must be confirmed via Logbook of The World (LoTW) <<http://www.arrrl.org/lotw/>>. All bands -- with the exception of 60 meters -- may be used in pursuit of the Triple Play Award.

The ARRL RTTY Round Up, held January 3-4, was one of the first organized events eligible for the award. "If the amount of activity in the 2009 ARRL RTTY Round Up is any indicator, the Triple Play is off to a fantastic start," said ARRL Contest Branch Manager Sean Kutzko, KX9X. "The RTTY Roundup was the first contest to take place since the award's inception. It ended only a few days ago, and we already have received almost 1100 logs. There's been a lot of chatter on the RTTY e-mail reflectors about getting the Triple Play completed, and I personally have seen numerous stations calling 'CQ Triple Play' on PSK31 since the first of the year. People already have their 'needed list' programmed into their PSK31 macros. There is no question that the new Triple Play award is causing a lot of buzz in the digital community. I'm happy that we have been able to come up with a new award that so many people are interested in right off the bat."

According to Norm Fusaro, W3IZ, Assistant Manager for the Membership and Volunteer Programs Department, hundreds of new LoTW certificates have been processed each day since the first of the year. "We are excited to see such an upswing in LoTW participation," he said. "I know what a thrill it can be to upload my logs to LoTW right after a contest and see the QSOs appear almost instantaneously. That's the magic of Logbook of The World."

Those who participated in the RTTY Round Up were ecstatic over how easy it was to use LoTW. Jose Castillo, N1BAA, of Amherst, Massachusetts, said, "Just amazing! Just under 24 hours since I uploaded my ARRL RTTY Round Up log and now I have Worked All States confirmed via LoTW [from just the RTTY

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Round Up]. Gotta love LoTW!" Bob Garceau, W1EQ, of Putnam, Connecticut agreed: "I'm impressed with the response to my uploaded log to LoTW. I uploaded 728 QSOs and 50 hours after the contest closed, I have 336 QSLs. That's a 46 percent response. Impressive! I think that someone will get #1 Triple Play by the end of January."

Don't be too upset if you wanted to work one of the digital modes and didn't participate in the RTTY Round Up -- other digital modes, such as PSK31 and Hellschreiber are also eligible for the digital portion of the award. The first ever 24 hour Hellschreiber sprint takes place January 17. According to the Feld Hell Club's Web site, all modes of Hell on any band (with the exception of 17, 30 and 60 meters) are allowed in the sprint <http://sites.google.com/site/feldhellclub/Home/contest_s>. If you like operating digital modes and you missed the RTTY Round Up, why not give the Feld Hell sprint a try? According to QST Editor and digital guru Steve Ford, WB8IMY, free sound card software for Hellschreiber, such as Fldigi <<http://www.w1hkj.com/Fldigi.html>>, MultiPSK (for PCs) <http://f6cte.free.fr/index_anglais.htm> and cocoaModem (for Macintosh) <<http://homepage.mac.com/chen/w7ay/cocoaModem/>> can be found online.

For SSB and CW aficionados, the North American QSO Parties (NAQP) start January 10: The CW portion is 1800 UTC January 10-0600 UTC January 11, and the phone portion is 1800 UTC January 17-0600 UTC January 18 (the NAQP RTTY Contest is 1800 UTC February 28-0600 UTC March 1). Of course, you don't have to participate in a contest to chase the Triple Play Award. As long as you submit your logs to Logbook of The World, you're good! LoTW is set up to calculate your Triple Play QSOs separately from your other QSOs.

ARRL Chief Executive Officer David Sumner, K1ZZ, warned that it can be "addictive" once you begin making your contacts for the Triple Play Award, and that "there are many possible variations on the theme. You can try to be the first (or at least the first on your block) or you can set your own pace. Think it's too easy? Limit yourself to QRP while operating your favorite mode (or all three). Maybe you prefer to be the quarry; it will quickly emerge which states are the most difficult to find, offering opportunities to earn the gratitude of your mates by activating the ones you can get to with your portable or mobile rig."

So get on the air, make contacts and submit them via Logbook of The World. Before you know it, you'll have something new to hang up on your shack wall.
