Fleamarket – Hour by Hour

Realizing that new members to the club may be hesitant to jump in and support the Flea Market or wonder how it works, here is your blow-by blow description of a typical event. All you old-timers can skip this (you've probably read it before) but it's the easiest way I can think of to initiate the newbies.

Friday, March 6, at the crack of dawn, roosters crowing — Hal N7NW will drag himself down to the Puyallup Fairgrounds and start measuring the floor for tables and power drops. At the same time, Gil W7GIL and the phone crew will start hanging their wires. Everyone else: Please sleep in and have a nice, leisurely breakfast. Tables can't be set up until the wires are hung and the drops are in place.

Friday 9AM — You big and little brutes can arrive to start setting up. The more people who show up, the easier the work. Be sure to bring gloves and real shoes—we don't want any smashed toes or fingers. We have about 300 tables and 500 chairs to set up. With 20 people working in two-man teams, we can have the entire two floors easily ready in a couple of hours. Remember, there's no need to park on the Fairgrounds itself unless you are bringing in setup materials. Everyone else, park out at the Gold Lot and [Continued on Page 4]

come in through the Administration entrance just west of the Gold Gate. Badges will be available at the loading door before 2 P.M. and at the Gold Gate at all other times.

Noon — For those who just put up 300 tables, it's a good time to take lunch. The club will provide pizza and pop.

Friday 1PM — One hour to go before we let the sellers in. Hopefully, the pallet jacks have arrived. The tables should be ready. Last-minute details abound. Put up signs. Set up announcing and the Country Store. Hang the banner out at the front gate. Test the phones. The clock ticks down. Registration ramps up.

2 to 7:30 PM. — This is it. We open the gates to the selling hordes who have been lined up since morning. They come in every type of vehicle: small cars, big vans and clunkers that don't even belong on the road. Each piled with the same junk ... ah, I mean merchandise ... we have come to love and recognize from the previous year. They race through registration, afraid of losing their place in line. They load pallet upon pallet, and we pull each one to its place on the floor. The first two hours will be a madhouse - everyone running every which way. It'll eventually slow to a continuous stream, hour after hour. As the sellers get set up, they start haggling between themselves. It becomes a social event as each gets caught up on the news from last year or the previous event.

Friday 7:30PM — Finally, we start pushing everyone out the door. The gate closes and the stragglers get unloaded. By 8, we can lock the doors and think about a nice dinner and maybe a few hours of sleep ... zzzzz ...

Saturday March 7, 5 AM, *before* the crack of dawn and before any rooster in his right mind would crow - we are at the Gold Gate waiting to get in. We have a half hour before we start letting sellers in again. Just enough time to start the coffee, to unlock the loading doors and remind ourselves about how much fun we are having.

Saturday 5:30AM — The loading process starts up again. Talk-in and announcing are busy, as is security. Someone needs to check electrical cords and make sure the fire extinguishers are clear. Everyone has a job to do. As 7:30 A.M. rolls around, the ticket booths are prepped and a line is already waiting at the corner.

Saturday 8 AM — We are selling tickets and the line makes its way to our front doors. Meanwhile, inside, you would think we'd already let the crowds in as the floor gets packed with sellers making last minute deals among themselves. By 8:30, we've closed the Orange Gate—one-half hour to show time. The last of the sellers are unloading and the Fire Department is making its inspection. Get those pallets out of the aisles and stack 'em outside.

9 AM to 3 PM — It's show time! What can I say? I just pick out a spot near the front doors and watch them come in. Lots of friends wave as they go by. As the buyers enter, they try to decide if their luck would be better upstairs or down. The floor is getting packed. The pallet, traffic and registration crews get to rest while others on the team are just getting started. The ticket sellers will be busy for hours while announcing and talk-in are helping the lost and confused. Security is trying to keep the people from using the wrong doors and the Country Store is doing whatever it is they do (oh, sell—that's right!). Next door, the VE team will be setting up to administer tests. Small fires come up here and there: a load needs moving, a seller needs tending. But, overall, it'll be another fine event.

Saturday 3PM — Most of the crowd has cleared. The last of the buyers are trying to eke out deals with the last of the sellers. The door prizes were finally all given out. Empty tables have appeared as sellers have sold out or otherwise packed and left for the day. It's been a long day and we are all tired of people and radios. Yet, the great egress is just starting. At 3 P.M. the sellers can grab pallets and start loading out. As they race to their vehicles, we take away the tables and chairs, and start restacking them. Over the next three hours, we will move out all those people it took two days to move in. Tempers will flare (but keep smiling), pallets run short, and the elevator will struggle with the load as we all sweat to move people and tables. But it'll all get done. As many of us head for a Chinese dinner, we'll rehash the past two days, stuff ourselves silly, and pat ourselves on the back and on the belly. Finally, as we waddle our way to our cars, we'll realize we did it! Another successful Flea Market. And next year it'll be even better.

Chairman Hal N3YX called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m.

Minutes: A motion to approve the minutes of the previous board meeting was made by Daniel and seconded by Robert. Motion passed.

Officer Reports:

Chairman of the Board – Hal N3YX: Nominations were opened at the January meeting.

President – Dick WA7NIW: Nothing to report

Vice President – Tim K7ANE: Not present

Secretary – Ivy WA7IVY: Not present

Treasurer – Carolyn WV7Q: There have been a number of people who expressed interest in being approved by the Board to be Treasurer. They are: Jim Aigner N7MU, Andrew Baze KE7RLJ, Alan Hughes KB7SBU, Kathy Martin KB7QMO, Robert Grinnell KD7WNV, Theresa Vaughn AD7CT, Michele Cross WB7AYU. These people will need to attend a Board meeting to be interviewed. There was one member who renewed in September, and three that renewed in October who paid cash. The identities of these members were lost. If you renewed at that time, please contact the Treasurer. A letter will be sent to Seattle Central Community College regarding payment for the license class that was held for their employees in September of 2007. Treasurer, Carolyn Pasquier, WV7Q, brought up her inability to obtain payment of \$700 of Club moneys due from a Technician class held at Seattle Central Community College (SCCC) in November of 2007. Hal Mueller, N3YX, COB, had run the class in the Club's name. Carolyn had written him a Club check for \$628.27, reimbursement for books, shipping, and ARRL fees, which included the materials and testing for that class. Hal said he had presented the class with two others, Mark Shepard and Brian Daley.

The class was put on at the request of a College official, Betty Lunceford, District Telecommunications

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Manager, for SCCC employees only. The agreed price was \$50 per student, which included books and \$14 test fees for 14 students, 11 of whom passed.

Hal said that Lunceford agreed that the College would pay the invoices Hal sent her, totaling \$700. Hal has not yet provided Carolyn with the emails he sent to Lunceford, nor the other documents needed to collect this account, but he agreed to do so within five days. Hal had taught another class, this one in April of 2008, at South Seattle Community College. He had given Carolyn all the students' checks payable to the Club in January 2009. One student had written a check for \$50 which her bank returned unpaid. Our bank charged us a \$5 bank fee. Hal agreed to help Carolyn track this person and try to collect.

Activity Manager – Daniel KL7WM: This month's program will be Mike Dinkelman and the Flea Market. The banquet will be March 27 at the Burien Elks club. Fred Lowell N7PZ won the top prize in the year end raffle.

Radio Officer – Paul N7DOH: Not present, no report.

Relay Editor – Gary KG7KU: Not present, no report.

Webmaster – Jim KD7BAT: The club received a request that we fill out a survey regarding non-profit organizations. We will look at the survey prior to decide whether to participate.

Something to Think About

Being the 'public face' of the Fleamarket as well as the Club Contact [phone] number, I get a lot of exposure to people who have absolutely no idea what to do when their Ham Radio spouse goes Silent Key. I've written about this before but this time of year just re-enforces the need to talk about this. This is when I get returned fliers with a plea not to send stuff anymore mail (it's a painful reminder) or questions about how to dispose of equipment. If you get hit by a bus tomorrow, will your spouse or estate have the resources necessary to handle your Ham estate?

The first thing you should have is instructions on how to cancel your license in your estate documentation. Licenses last for 10 years. If the license is not canceled, that can mean up to ten years of painful reminders from advertisers. For our flyer mailings, we use the FCC database. It's simply a dump of the available Hams in specified zip codes. It's up to your estate to let the FCC know you are deceased. It's easy to do and I usually mail the instructions back to those who obviously need them. I've included a copy of the instructions in the article which follows this one.

Then, there is all that equipment you own, plus the junk you're hiding in the shed, garage, and attic. Frequently we have no discussion with anybody in the family regarding the worth of our equipment. That new radio may cost as much as a small car but most people outside of Ham Radio aren't going to realize that when you can buy the latest whiz-bang consumer electronics for a few hundred dollars. That nice dual band hand-held may look like a child's walkie-talkie to the unknowing. I've heard horror stories of scammers coming in and offering pennies on the dollar because the estate didn't know what the equipment was worth and/or were just looking to clear the stuff out at any price. If you don't want to discuss your station's worth with the family, at least leave a document detailing the relative worth of your equipment.

Another tip; get rid of your junk! You may think you're going to use that stuff someday but if it's sat there for 2 years or longer and you haven't even laid eyes on it, sell it or dump it. (Some of this stuff may actually be considered hazardous material.)

Finally, determine someone who can be your advocate and put that in your estate documentation. Ask a good Ham friend or even a Club if they are willing to help provide guidance when it comes time to disposing of your estate. By the way, if you are asked to be an advocate, or to dispose of an estate, it's not an easy job and can take years if stuff is hard to sell. I also feel (personal opinion) you are ethically bound not to profit by handling another's estate. It's likely they need the money worse than you do. I'm not saying you should go into the hole but don't cut yourself a great deal on a piece of equipment when you know you could have sold it for more. Remember that golden rule, do unto others as you would have them do unto you (or if you prefer, store up some good Karma).

Canceling An Amateur Radio License With The FCC

- 1) You may provide proof of death in the form of a copy of the death certificate or a copy of an obituary with the date of death listed.
- 2) Send this information (a copy is fine) via FAX or Mail along with a cover letter to the FCC requesting that the individual's call sign be canceled. A sample form of the letter follows:
